Holiday Notices

Thursford Christmas Spectacular (7th, 8th & 9th December)

For those going to this, please remember to bring your cheques to the September meeting (payable to Sherwood U3A). £129 for those sharing & £148 for single rooms.

Floriade (10th – 14th April 2012)

I have now only 3 twin cabins left for this river cruise which starts in Amsterdam. Free excursions include Floriade staged in Venlo, with its ten-yearly display of wonderful plants, flowers and vegetables in five themed zones which include exhibitions, shows and events from around the world. A second excursion, also included in the price, will be to Keukenhof to see the Dutch bulb fields. Cost for full board is £419 for the promenade deck and £399 for the main deck.

After more negotiations the deposits of £50 pp will now be due in November (payable to Sherwood U3A) and the single supplement for those five lucky members having a cabin to themselves has been cut to £55 instead of £100! For those who will need insurance the director has also reduced the cost of a no age limit insurance to £19 pp – especially for us! (If we can fill the last three cabins there will be 68 of us. This means we will have the MV Diana to ourselves which will be ideal.)

Cotswolds 6th – 10th July 2012

Cost without gardens will be £206 sharing & £254 for singles (this is for coach & hotel and also includes driver's gratuity and portage) We expect the gardens to be approximately £30. These will be announced by the Mansfield Garden Visits group in February after the new prices come out. Deposits are not needed until December.

Places for this holiday based at the Holiday Inn in Gloucester, have all been taken, but as usual I am opening a waiting list for anyone still interested. From past experience because of our age group there will probably be cancellations nearer to the date of travel due to hospital appointment dates, or operations which will obviously be a priority!

Recent Events

The Loire Experience

SPEAK to any of the 46 travellers on this holiday and you will probably get 46 different points of view. Eventful? Yes. Boring? It was not!

Our tour guide, Sue, was excellent. She added much interest to the holiday and her knowledge of the area was faultless.

After breakfast on our first day in France, just outside Paris, Sue guided Alan, our coach driver, to Orleans and gave a brief synopsis on the history of Joan of Arc. We arrived at Orleans and Alan valiantly drove his coach around the maze of narrow streets. Oh la la – what is ahead? Only road works and the road is blocked! The French, walking past, shook their heads and one French lady told Alan “*You are in trouble!*” However, we were all despatched on foot to enjoy the sights of Orleans: there is a wonderful cathedral with an old area being excavated/renovated. Upon our return to the appointed meeting spot, our coach had “escaped” and we continued our journey to Tours.

First sighting of the Mercure Hotel in Tours was not promising. It was a small round-fronted hotel with the main road on one side and a railway line/station on the other side but well double glazed! The staff were lovely and the receptionist, Julie, did not object to 4 ladies (no names mentioned) finishing off the evenings with a somewhat noisy game of Uno. I liked this hotel – it was in the centre of Tours and very convenient. Too bad we had to travel to another venue for the evening meals that were abysmal and there were several complaints. However, the hotel made an effort on the last evening and provided us with lovely wine, canapés and a tasty “last supper!”

The daily excursions from Tours to the various châteaux went smoothly and the joint efforts of Sue and Alan (although their relationship was a little frosty following the Orleans experience) ensured that we had a lovely holiday.

16th century Château Chenonceau, built by the River Cher.

This building contained tapestries, paintings and furniture, including four-poster beds. There is also a gallery 60 metres x 6 metres, with a Renaissance fireplace at either end. This property has been owned by the Menier chocolate family since 1913.

Château Amboise, overlooking the River Loire and the River Amasse.

This château had been 6 times larger in the past but was still a beautiful building with sumptuous interior. The most impressive was the Council Chamber which was used for festivities for the Royal Court. One of the favourite festivals had been produced by Leonardo de Vinci whose ingenious machinery made it possible to reproduce the trajectories of the stars.

Saumur with wine tasting at Gratien and Meyer.

Saumur was a château overlooking the Loire. I did not go into this building but spent more time exploring the town. Sales were advertised in the shops but items were still very expensive so it was just a case of window shopping. In the afternoon, we made our first stop for wine tasting.

Gratien and Meyer are a German-owned winery and they specialise in sparkling wines. After driving six “less able” members in a buggy up a steep incline to the caves, a most competent young English girl, with a passionate knowledge of the production of their wines, showed us around the various caves, each one showing the processes of the wine making. However, I was not too keen on this wine and did not purchase any.

Royal Fortress Chinon with wine tasting at la Maison du Vin et du Tourisme.

This was an interesting visit. The guide gave us a very detailed talk on the history of the building

and, although incomplete, some renovation had taken place. There were symbols engraved in a dungeon section, allegedly by the Templar Knights.

In the afternoon, we had a second wine tasting at a smaller venue. It seemed to me to be a sort of winemakers co-operative. A very nice young man called Wilfred told us about the wine and a wine maker Jean poured the wine and we enjoyed this with the canapés. I liked this red wine and bought two bottles. Got to support the small businesses!

Château Villandry.

This was the last château of the tour and owned by the Carvallo family. The rooms were beautiful and well furnished. The six gardens surrounding this château were particularly spectacular. The gardens consisted of, Water, Sun, Herb and Vegetable Gardens, plus a hornbeam maze. These were very high maintenance, particularly the Ornamental gardens which were a square, planted in quarters, containing different-shaped hedges and symbolised love: Tender, Passionate, Fickle and Tragic love. Nothing much changed there then!

Journey home

En route to our final hotel, we were taken to Paris for a boat trip on the Seine. This was particularly lovely for me as I have never been to Paris. On the river boat we saw some lovely views and listened to a recording of Edith Piaf. I sang along with her and almost cleared the decks but one young man standing nearby said he thought I was a professional – what a charmer!



On the last stage of the journey home, the tour guide even conjured up an interesting service area. An estuary with a nature reserve named the Baie de Somme. This had a viewing tower plus interesting, educational walks/film shows.

Scares

During the course of the holiday we had a scare which resulted in Sylvia taking Fred to the hospital to be checked over but, thankfully, he was given the all-clear. Then there were a couple of incidents of upset tummies and finally, on Bastille Day, Sylvia fell over in Tours whilst taking photographs and broke her femur. She was admitted to the Tours hospital and awaited a hip operation. However, she was eventually airlifted home and admitted to the QMC hospital, Nottingham for her operation. In fact she got home before the rest of us, which was reassuring for Colin, who did not want to leave Sylvia behind in France.

In summary, I would say the holiday was a success for me because I have seen some wonderful sights, enjoyed good company and learned a bit more about French history.
